Why Does the Church Teach About Issues Affecting Public Policy? (Cont'd)

The Church's obligation to participate in shaping the moral character of society is a requirement of our faith. It is a basic part of the mission we have received from Jesus Christ, who offers a vision of life revealed to us in Sacred Scripture and Tradition. To echo the teaching of the Second Vatican Council: Christ, the Word made flesh, in showing us the Father's love, also shows us what it truly means to be human (see *Gaudium et Spes*, no. 22). Christ's love for us lets us see our human dignity in full clarity and compels us to love our neighbors as he has loved us. Christ, the Teacher, shows us what is true and good, that is, what is in accord with our human nature as free, intelligent beings created in God's image and likeness and endowed by the Creator with dignity and rights as well as duties.

Christ also reveals to us the weaknesses that are part of all human endeavors. In the language of revelation, we are confronted with sin, both personal and structural. "The Church's wisdom," according to Pope Benedict XVI, "has always pointed to the presence of original sin in social conditions and in the structure of society" (*Caritas in Veritate*, no. 34). All "structures of sin," as St. John Paul II calls them, "are rooted in personal sin, and thus always linked to the concrete acts of individuals who introduce these structures, consolidate them and make them difficult to remove" (*Sollicitudo Rei Socialis*, no. 36). Thus, our faith helps us understand that the pursuit of a civilization of love must address our own failures and the ways in which these failures distort the

broader ordering of the society in which we live. In the words of the Catechism of the Catholic Church, "Ignorance of the fact that man has a wounded nature inclined to evil gives rise to serious errors in the areas of education, politics, social action and morals" (no. 407). As Pope Francis, quoting Pope Benedict XVI, reaffirmed in *Evangelii Gaudium*, "We need to be convinced that charity 'is the principle not only of micro-relationships (with friends, with family members or within small groups) but also of macro-relationships (social, economic and political ones)'" (no. 205).

What faith teaches about the dignity of the human person, about the sacredness of every human life, and about humanity's strengths and weaknesses helps us see more clearly the same truths that also come to us through the gift of human reason. At the center of these truths is respect for the dignity of every person. This is the core of Catholic moral and social teaching. Because we are people of both faith and reason, it is appropriate and necessary for us to bring this essential truth about human life and dignity to the public square. We are called to practice Christ's commandment to "love one another" (Jn 13:34). We are also called to promote the well-being of all, to share our blessings with those most in need, to defend marriage, and to protect the lives and dignity of all, especially the weak, the vulnerable, the voiceless. In his first encyclical letter, *Deus Caritas Est*, Pope Benedict XVI explained that "charity must animate the entire lives of the lay faithful and therefore also their political activity, lived as 'social charity'" (no. 29).

Some question whether it is appropriate for the Church to play a role in political life. However, the obligation to teach the moral truths that should shape our lives, including our public lives, is central to the mission given to the Church by Jesus Christ. Moreover, the United States Constitution protects the right of individual believers and religious bodies to participate and speak out without government interference, favoritism, or discrimination. Civil law should fully recognize and protect the right of the Church and other institutions in civil society to participate in cultural, political, and economic life without being forced to abandon or ignore their central moral convictions. Our nation's tradition of pluralism is enhanced, not threatened, when religious groups and people of faith bring their convictions and concerns into public life. Indeed, our Church's teaching is in accord with the foundational values that have shaped our nation's history: "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness."

The Catholic community brings important assets to the political dialogue about our nation's future. We bring a consistent moral framework-drawn from basic human reason that is illuminated by Scripture and the teaching of the Church-for assessing issues, political platforms, and campaigns. We also bring broad experience in serving those in need-educating the young, serving families in crisis, caring for the sick, sheltering the homeless, helping women who face difficult pregnancies, feeding the hungry, welcoming immigrants and refugees, reaching out in global solidarity, and pursuing peace. We celebrate, with all our neighbors, the historically robust commitment to religious freedom in this country that has allowed the Church the freedom to serve the common good.

We must consider not only candidates' positions on these issues,
but their character and integrity as well.

Living Word...Living the Word

Morning, Church!

Without hesitation, I'd say, living one's faith is much more challenging if we practice the Beatitudes and the Spiritual and Corporal Works of Mercy than it is in just adhering to the "shalt nots" of the Commandments. It just is.

In these latter Sundays of September we're *confronted* by the Letter of James, who, with his brother, John, are given the nickname "Sons of Thunder" by Jesus. They are aptly named!

Take a closer look at excerpts from James' epistle:

- Sept 1: "Humbly welcome the Word that has been planted in you and is able to save your souls. Be doers of the Word and not hearers only, deluding yourselves."
- Sept 8: "...show no partiality...have you not made distinctions among yourselves and become judges with evil designs?"
- Sept 15: "What good is it...to say I have faith but do not have works?"
- Sept 22: "Where do the wars...conflicts among you come from?"
- Sept 29: (We'll break this open next week)
"Behold, the wages you withheld from your workers who harvested your fields..."

In each piece of James' epistle, he makes contrasts between what he calls the "wise" and the "wicked". In today's text, the wise enjoy every good gift and bear fruit for God. Their lives are generative, begetting virtues of peace, purity, gentleness, humility, mercy, goodness, faithfulness, and sincerity. While the wicked perpetuate darkness by their own narcissistic and evil tendencies.

For believers who strive to live gospel values and the virtuous life, James stretches us even further. He reminds us today that justice begets justice ~ God's justice. "*Find out what belongs to whom and give it back*" kind of justice. When we sow in peace and cultivate peace, we reap peace for ourselves and our dear neighbors.

"You reap what you sow."

The wicked reap what they sow, too! Their lives are in constant upheaval because of "wars" and conflicts they create and perpetuate. Their divided hearts and unintegrated desires skew their deepest passions and lead them to say and do what contradicts the gospel. Unholy longings/desires can only lead to a fruitless life, one with no loving legacy.

The "wicked" in all of us needs constant healing and redirection (conversion). Our passions need to take a graced U-turn. We need humility and a *fresh desire* to desire *what God desires for us*: wholeness and healing.

Wholeness and healing are our *Spiritual Exacta*. They become visible in our lives when we live and do the gospel through the Spiritual and Corporal Works of Mercy, nothing more, nothing less.

Palabra Viva...Viviendo La Palabra

¡Buenos días, Iglesia!

Sin dudarlo, diría que vivir la fe es mucho más desafiante si practicamos las Bienaventuranzas y las Obras de Misericordia Espirituales y Corporales que simplemente adherirse a las “prohibiciones” de los Mandamientos. Simplemente lo es.

En estos últimos domingos de septiembre nos enfrentamos a la Carta de Santiago, que, con su hermano, Juan, reciben de Jesús el sobrenombre de “Hijos del Trueno”. ¡Tienen un nombre acertado!

Eche un vistazo más de cerca a extractos de la epístola de Santiago:

- 1 de sept: “Acoged humildemente la Palabra que ha sido plantada en vosotros y que puede salvar vuestras almas. Sed hacedores de la Palabra y no sólo oidores, engañándoos a vosotros mismos”.
- 8 de sept: “...no hagáis acepción de personas... ¿no habéis hecho distinciones entre vosotros? ¿Y convertiros en jueces con malos designios?
- 15 de sept: “¿De qué sirve... decir que tengo fe pero no tengo obras?”
- 22 de sept: “¿De dónde vienen las guerras... los conflictos entre vosotros?”
- 29 de sept: (Abriremos esto la próxima semana)
“He aquí el salario que retuvisteis de los trabajadores que cosechaban vuestras tierras...”

En cada fragmento de la epístola de Santiago, hace contrastes entre lo que llama los “sabios” y los “malvados”. En el texto de hoy, los sabios disfrutan de todo buen don y dan fruto para Dios. Sus vidas son generativas y engendran virtudes de paz, pureza, gentileza, humildad, misericordia, bondad, fidelidad y sinceridad. Mientras que los malvados perpetúan la oscuridad por sus propias tendencias narcisistas y malvadas.

Para creyentes que se esfuerzan por vivir los valores del evangelio y la vida virtuosa. James nos lleva aún más lejos. Nos recuerda hoy que la justicia engendra justicia ~ la justicia de Dios. Una especie de justicia tipo “descubrir qué pertenece a quién y devolverlo”. Cuando sembramos en paz y cultivamos la paz, cosechamos paz para nosotros y nuestros queridos vecinos.

“Se cosecha lo que se siembra”.

¡Los malvados también cosechan lo que siembran! Sus vidas están en constante agitación debido a las “guerras” y los conflictos que crean y perpetúan. Sus corazones divididos y sus deseos no integrados distorsionan sus pasiones más profundas y los llevan a decir y hacer lo que contradice el evangelio. Los anhelos/deseos impíos sólo pueden conducir a una vida infructuosa, sin un legado amoroso.

Los “malvados” que todos llevamos dentro necesitan sanación y redirección (conversión) constantes.
Nuestras pasiones necesitan para dar un elegante giro en U. Necesitamos humildad y un nuevo deseo de desear lo que Dios desea para nosotros: plenitud y curación.

La plenitud y la curación son nuestra Exacta Espiritual. Se vuelven visibles en nuestras vidas cuando vivimos y hacer el evangelio a través de las Obras de Misericordia Espirituales y Corporales, nada más y nada menos.


