

Pope Francis continues Love compels us "to 'go into all the world and proclaim the good news to the whole creation' (Mk 16:15) (Evangelii Gaudium, no. 181). Here, the creation' refers to every aspect of human life; consequently, 'the mission of proclaiming the good news of Jesus Christ has a universal destination. Its mandate of charity encompasses all dimensions of existence, all individuals, all areas of community life, and all peoples. Nothing human can be alien to it. (Evangelii Gaudium, no. 181).

This "mandate" includes our engagement in political life. The political realities of our nation present us with opportunities and challenges. We are a nation founded on "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness," but the right to life itself is not fully protected, especially for unborn children, the terminally ill, and the elderly, the most vulnerable members of the American family. We are called to be peacemakers in a nation at war. We are a country pledged to pursue "liberty and justice for all," but we are too often divided across lines of race, ethnicity, and economic inequality.

We are a nation of immigrants, struggling to address the challenges of many new immigrants in our midst. We are a society built on the strength of our families, called to defend marriage and offer moral and economic supports for family life. We are a powerful nation in a violent world, confronting terror and trying to build a safer, more just, more peaceful world. We are an affluent society where too many live in poverty and lack health care and other necessities of life. We are part of a global community charged with being good stewards of the earth's environment, what Pope Francis calls "our common home," which is being threatened. These challenges are at the heart of public life and at the center of the pursuit of the common good.

They are intertwined and inseparable. As Pope Francis has insisted, "We are faced . . . with one complex crisis which is both social and environmental. Strategies for a solution demand an integrated approach to combating poverty, restoring dignity to the excluded, and at the same time protecting nature" (Laudato Si', no. 139).

For many years, we bishops of the United States have sought to share Catholic teaching on social and political life. We have done so in a series of statements issued every four years focused on "political responsibility" or "faithful citizenship." In this document we continue that practice, maintaining continuity with what we have said in the past in light of new challenges facing our nation and world. This is not new teaching but affirms what is taught by our bishops' conference and the whole Church.

As Catholics, we are part of a community with a rich heritage that helps us consider the challenges in public life and contribute to greater justice and peace for all people. Part of that rich heritage on faithful citizenship is the teaching of Vatican Council II's Declaration on Religious Liberty (Dignitatis Humanae). It says that "society itself may profit by the moral qualities of justice and peace which have their origin in people's faithfulness to God and to God's holy will" (no. 6). The work for justice requires that the mind and the heart of Catholics be educated and formed to know and practice the whole faith.

We must consider not only candidates' positions on these issues, but their character and integrity as well.

"EPHPHATHA! BE OPENED!"

Morning, Church!

In his book <u>Jesus:A Pilgrimage</u>, Fr. James Martin, S.J. shares this story: A few years ago in the Holy Land, with about a hundred other pilgrims, we got caught in a little rain shower in Jerusalem. We were on the Mt. of Olives, which is, as you'll remember, from the Good Friday readings, is just outside the city walls. Some in our group were taking photos of the Old City, which spreads out before you, as you stand on the Mt. of Olives. Fortunately, I sat inside our tour bus, talking to another pilgrim, so I didn't get wet. I remember the rain streaming down the big windows of the tour bus like tears.

Suddenly there I heard a knock on the closed door of the bus. Our Israeli tour guide, Maher, a Catholic man form Galilee, needed the attention of the bus driver, saying, "Ephphatha! Ephphatha!" in response, the bus driver, Tony, immediately opened the door. This is an electric moment for me, I know Maher is a Christian who speaks Aramaic, and Tony know Aramaic, too. I never heard Aramaic used like that, as a living language. Of course I immediately thought of today's gospel passage:

"Ephphatha! Be opened!"

After all my years of studying theology and scripture, I wondered why the gospels have a few foreign words sprinkled throughout the English-language version of the gospel. Why leave this word untranslated like the rest of Jesus' words? The reason is this: in the middle of Mark's *Greek* narrative about the healing of the deaf and mute man, you come upon an Aramaic word: "Ephphatha!" (*Be released!*)

Jesus spoke Aramaic other miracles: the raising of Jarius' daughter, "Talitha koum" which means, "Little Lamb, arise." From the cross Jesus said, "Eli, Eli, lema sabachtani", which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" In the marvelous, post-resurrection story, when Mary Magdalen recognizes Jesus on Easter Sunday, she proclaims, "Rabboni", meaning "Rabbi".



Jesus understood our human condition. He saw people who were ill, frustrated, and angry. He saw life and death, good and evil, sin and even corruption. Like Jesus, we are asked not to shrink before evil, falter in doing the right thing, and never doubt that God has the power to heal, cast out evil, and utterly change things. Even with something that seems incurable at this man's illness, we do not despair.

We and our Church need to be opened to the various ways we are deaf and dumb, in not speaking up about the injustices within us and within the Church. Jesus desires that we "be opened" so we can be healed of our sins and failings. We need to bring ourselves and the Church before Jesus so we can be opened and healed. We need to let it all out, so our deafness and dumbness can be confronted, changed and healed. Jesus is banging on the door of the Church and on our hearts, shouting out,

"Ephphatha! Be released! Be opened!"




